Lastly, the drape for the North pedestal has been misplaced. If you run across it, please either place it on the North pedestal or the Tyler's desk. Thank you.



SECRETARY'S TABLE

THE 47TH PROBLEM OF EUCLID, PART II

Continued from last month's Trestleboard

Here, you WILL be able to create a perfect square with only sticks and string, just as our ancestors did.

You will need 4 thin sticks which are strong enough to stick into the soft soil, 40 inches of string and a black magic marker. Actually, any length will work, but this size is very manageable. The larger the foundation which the Mason wished to build, naturally, the longer his rope (string) would have to be.

- 1. Place your 1st stick flat on the ground so that its ends point north and south.
- 2. Next, take a string (it's much more unwieldy if you use rope) and tie knots in it three inches apart. This will divide the string into 12 equal divisions. Tie the two ends of the string together (this is your 12th knot)... again... remember that from knot-to-knot must be 3 inches apart. The divisions between knots must be correct and equal or it will not work. Your string's total length is 36". After you've tied the end-to-end knot, you may cut off the excess 4" of string. If you have more than 4" of string left or less than 4" of string left, you need to remeasure the lengths between your knots. Your string is now circular in shape and has 12 knots and 12 divisions between the knots.

Note: The Operative Masons of old, used rope, however, because much of the length of the rope is within the knot, if you use rope, you must use a longer piece, measure each division, tie your knot, and then measure your next 3 inch division before you cut the length of rope, instead of marking the entire rope while it is lying flat and then tying your knots.

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The History of Freemasonry

From The George Washington Masonic National Memorial

United States 1785-1825

When President George Washington laid the cornerstone of the U.S. Capitol in a Masonic ceremony in 1793, he symbolically established the country and embodied Freemasonry's preeminence. The Capitol would house the American states' representatives as the country grew into a great nation. Modeling itself after classical Rome, the federal government chose the Latin motto "E Pluribus Unum" (Out of Many, One). Legislators met in state capitols and were called senators.

From this political stability, the United States grew and Free-masonry flourished. The Louisiana Purchase of 1803 extended the nation's territory westward to the Rocky Mountains. Between 1800 and 1826, eight new states joined the Union, and the nation's population grew from five million to nearly eleven million. Yankee clipper ships carried American goods around wht world, while keelboats and steamboats connected Pittsburgh with St. Louis and New Orleans. Industry and small farming grew in the North while in the South, slavery spread as tobacco, cotton and sugar plantations created a prosperous economy.

As the Constitution created the federal government, American Freemasons chose another path. Each state established independent Grand Lodges that encouraged greater unity and growth. For example, during Paul Revere's term as Grand Master of Massachusetts (1795-97), he chartered over 100 Lodges.

As land was settled, local Lodges organized under a new Grand Lodge as states joined the union. These frontier Lodges provided social activities and a sense of stability and legitimacy to what might otherwise bed just a river landing or crossroads. In cities, Lodges were friendly sanctuaries from the uncertainty of commerce and at the same time portals to affluent society.





Washington With Allegory of Freedom and Justice

Even before his death, Freemasons worldwide seized upon Washington as a laudable role model. This image first appeared in the 1790's and reappeared some 30 years later on dinner plates. The persistence of the image attests to Freemasonry's reverence for Washington.



The **Betsy Ross flag** is an early design of the flag of the United States, popularly – but very likely incorrectly – attributed to Betsy Ross, using the common motifs of alternating red-and-white striped field with five-pointed stars in a blue canton. The first documented usage of this flag was in 1792. The flag features 13 stars to represent the original 13 colonies with the stars arranged in a circle.



- 3. Stab your 2nd stick in the ground near either end of your North/South stick and arrange a knot at the stick. Stretch 3 divisions away from it in any direction (9 inches) and insert the 3rd stick in the ground, then place the 4th stick so that it falls on the knot between the 4-part and the 5-part division (12 inches). This forces the creation of a 3:4:5: right triangle. The angle between the 3 units and the 4 units is, of necessity, a square or right angle.
- 4. Now, move your 3rd and 4th sticks until they become a right angle (90 degrees) to your North/South stick.

Congratulations! You now have not only the ability to square your square, but to lay a geometrically correct cornerstone for your new foundation!



However, usage of the 47th Problem of Euclid doesn't end here...

Here is the rest of the story...

The Forty-Seventh Problem of Euclid in Today's World

With this simple geometric 3:4:5 ratio of how to create a 90 degree, Right Angle:

- 1. Man can reach out into space and measure the distance of the stars . . . in light years!
- 2. He can survey land, mark off boundaries and construct every single thing on Earth.

- 3. He can build homes, churches and buildings, and with the knowledge of this simple ratio...he can begin digging on opposite sides of a mountain and dig a straight tunnel through the center of it . . . that meets exactly at the center!
- 4. He can navigate the oceans and be able to locate himself in the middle of the water (with no land in sight) . . . AND is also able to calculate how far he has come and how much farther he must go!

The 47th Problem of Euclid, also known as the 47th Proposition of Euclid...or the Pythagorean Theorem teaches each of us to not only be general lovers of the arts and sciences, but to stand in awe of the God -given knowledge with which you can take a piece of string and 4 sticks...and be able to find your way home! . . .



from anywhere on Earth, on the Sea or in the Heavens.

The 47th Problem of Euclid represents such a perfect symbol of Freemasonry...encompassing both art and science, that the simple knowledge of it demands a breathtaking awe to which we may only bow our heads in reverence at the perfection, the universality and the infinite wisdom of that which has been given to us by God.

With the knowledge of this simple geometric ratio, (provided by the 47th Problem of Euclid), the word "Eureka!" almost pails in expressing the fundamental powers which our Creator has bestowed upon us!

...AND it all begins by simply learning how to Square your Square.

Oh!..., and one last thing you have also learned (but may not have realized it) . . . This is why the old antique, wooden carpenter squares which you have seen or have heard about have one longer leg. Their "legs" were created using the "3" and "4" part of the 3:4:5 ratio (the 5 is the hypotenuse) using the 47th Problem of Euclid. Equal length "legs" on modern day (carpenter) squares are relatively "new" technology..

...And THAT is the Rest of the Story!

OUT OF THE ASHES: WINSLOW LODGE NO. 13

On the morning of October 10th, 2014, the brothers and sisters of Winslow Lodge No. 13 awoke to discover that their ninety year old temple building had been destroyed by fire. Three young men had strategically set several fires around the historic building along with two other buildings in the area. Early reports indicated that the men set the fires, "simply out of boredom."

While the Lodge was unoccupied when it was burned, many important and historical items were lost. Damage was estimated at approximately \$4 million, but most of the items and relics lost were irreplaceable. Those priceless items included original antique furniture, regalia from the 1800s, as well as regalia from



the Order of the Eastern
Star and Commandery of
Knights Templar along with
irreplaceable documents,
paraphernalia and so much
more from their 120 year
history. Those items will
never be replaced, but firefighters were able to save
many archives and records
from the lodge, as well as
photos and a display of first
edition Bibles.

According to one of the Lodge officers with whom I spoke at the 2015 Grand Lodge Communication, police estimated that the arsonists had been in the building for two hours before they set the fires. He said that if only they had had a security alarm, the loss might have been prevented. This lesson was not lost on the Trustees of Yuma Lodge.

With only the front façade of the original building standing, the brethren of Winslow Lodge got to work rebuilding their temple.



The nearby Winslow Elks Lodge opened the doors of their own beautiful building to provide a temporary home not only for the displaced Winslow Lodge, but also their York Rite and Eastern Star bodies as well. As word spread throughout the country, Masons everywhere offered donations of money, aprons, furnishings, and other necessary items. Yuma Lodge donated \$500.





Two and a half years and \$1 million after a blaze, on May 27, 2017, the Masons conducted a rebirth and dedication cornerstone ceremony for the reestablished Winslow No. 13 by placing a new cornerstone and welcoming members back.



The three suspects were apprehended and arrested on charges of burglary, criminal damage and arson, and are currently serving prison sentences
