


Greetings from the South.

MORALS AND ETHICS AND THEIR DIFFERENCE

Morals and Ethics are fundamental to Masonry. In western culture, Greek philosophers initiated discussions and stressed the importance of Morals and Ethics. As humanity evolved it became more and more important to know the meaning of these two subjects and to incorporate Morals and Ethics in the development of civilization.

Since then, multiple and diverse interpretations of the meaning and difference of Morals and Ethics have surfaced and evolved.

This is an opportunity to present general definitions and the possible differences most authors recognize for Morals and Ethics.

In future Trestle Board articles we will discuss the different philosophical tendencies in each of these subjects.

Definition of Morals

Morals are the social, cultural and religious beliefs or values of au individual or group which tells us what is right or wrong. They are the rules and standards made by the society or culture which is to be followed by us while deciding what is right Some moral principles are:

- Always tell the truth
- Be generous

Morals refer to the beliefs what is oot objectively right, but what is considered right for any situation, so it can be said that what is morally correct may not be objectively correct.

Conclusion

Freemasonry's purpose is to improve men so that they may improve society. Freemasonry explains the journey for perfection through the rough ashlar, symbolizing ignorance and barbarism, and the perfect ashlar, symbolizing knowledge and civility.

George Washington's own journey led him to perfection in service to his nation and everlasting honor. Although he made mistakes and had his own limitations, he never ceased laboring toward virtue.

Throughout its history, America and Americans have made mistakes and perpetuated and suffered great injustices. Masonic behavior is a subject, if taken into the Lodge for debate, could take up a lot of time. Behavior changes with attitude and the ever shifting social structure.

In the old charges behavior was divided into six sections:

- 1. Behavior in Lodge.
- 2. Behavior after Lodge with members who did not attend.
- 3. Behavior when brethren meet outside the Lodge.
- 4. Behavior in the presence of non-members.
- 5. Behavior at home and in your neighborhood.
- 6. Behavior toward a strange brother.

Behavior is generally affected by two means:

- 1. By those around you.
- 2. By age.

Normally, we are respectful of the people around us, more now than when we were younger. We also have much more tolerance, mainly because of those who tolerated and respected us.

Our behavior is a reflection of who we are and as a Mason this image either improves or taints our institution. To be a considerate member of the Lodge and our brethren is easy. To be a person of integrity to strange brothers, non-members, and even those who would seek to discredit the fraternity, is the most important act of brotherly love one could do for his Lodge and its members.

A Lodge is only as good as its worse member; therefore strive to be a better person.


