





THE MAGI By Antero Trujillo, Chaplain

According to Christian tradition, there are three important wise men known as The Magi. They appeared after the birth of Jesus, they arrived from the East to worship him, following a star that guided them and announced the arrival of the Savior. We are summarizing and giving a

brief commentary of an article by Sir Knight Michael Costello, III that first appeared in the Knight Templar Magazine, Vol. LXIII No. 12, published in December 2017.

It starts presenting the Gospel of Matthews, which is the only one canonical gospel to tell the story of The Magi in Chapter Two. It then goes on to describe the etymological significance of The Magi. The word Magi is plural from the Latin Magus, derived from the Greek Magos, which means this word comes from Old Persian, particularly from a group of priests, the priests of Zoroastrianism, who paid particular attention to the stars. They were famous for astrology practices and were known as Magi.

WHO WERE THEY?

In the western Christian Church, they were considered saints and were known as Melchior, Caspar (also Gaspar or Jaspar), and Baltazar. Their ages are believed to have been 60, 40, and 20 years, respectively.

WHERE DID THEY COME FROM?

The author mentions Matthew, who affirms in the Gospel that the Magi came from the East. Traditionally, it is believed they were Babylonians, Persians, or Jews from Yemen. In the American tradition, we believe that Baltazar was an Arab, Melchior came from Persia, and Gaspar from India.

THE GIFTS

The author mentions Matthew again, who claims the gifts were gold, frankincense, and myrrh. There are different theories that explain the significance and symbolism of these presents. The author stays with two of these theories. First, the three gifts are ordinary offerings and gifts given to a King. Myrrh has been commonly used as anointing oil, frankincense as a perfume, and gold as a valuable. Second, the three gifts have spiritual meaning: gold as a symbol of Kingship on earth, frankincense as a symbol of deity, and mirth (an embalming oil) as a symbol of death. This second theory can also be interpreted as "gold, as to a King; myrrh, as to one who was mortal; and incense, as to a God".

THE STAR

The author mentions several of the astronomical events that may have coincided with the appearance of "The Star of Christmas" that guided the wise men to Bethlehem. In [a previous] article, there were literal explications that the author believes explains better the appearance of this star. Exceptionally bright planetary conjunctions occurred in 2, 6, and 7 B.C; among these, the likely candidate for the holy star was the triple conjunction of Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn in 6 B.C.

The theory I like best is the conjunction of Jupiter and Regulus in the constellation of Leo. Here we have the "three kings" in one. First, you have Jupiter, the "king of the planets". Second, you have Regulus, the "king star." Third, you have the constellation of Leo, the lion or "king of the beasts." Through the use of sophisticated astronomical software, archeo-astronomers can date the conjunction to around 4 B.C. This fits in closely with the date that modern historians say that Christ was born.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, the author believes this paper sheds a little more light on the wise men or Magi. And the author hopes your interest is sparked and perhaps leads you to do some more research.

FROM THE DESK OF THE JUNIOR GRAND DEACON

Our lodge has a number of good men in it and I am proud to know them.

Are you aware of the sacrifices that go on in the Lodge? The only – only – sacrifices are time and money. You are expected (not forced, but expected) to attend Lodge one or two evenings a month and to pay lodge dues. Those dues are set by the Lodge budget. They pay for rent, utilities, amortization of Lodge furniture, etc. There are functions that the lodge participates in for the betterment of the Lodge and its members. Your only "skin in the game" for these functions is your time. We are all taught how

to divide our time. Is your time so precious that you cannot afford to give a little to your brothers? There is talk from time to time about goats and sheep in the Lodge, however there is no sacrifice of any living thing period.

We all serve a master that is the Great Architect of the Universe and no other. We feel that a man's beliefs are entirely between the man and the deity. It is not our place to get between them or to direct how they should relate to one another (as if we ever could...). Masonry encourages members to attend the church of their choice. Freemasonry does not teach theology, does not promise salvation, and has no Masonic deity. Our meetings include prayers, but these are ecumenical, much like those said at the opening of a town council meeting.

There are some words which sometimes confuse people. These words come from the language of when Freemasonry started. The head of the lodge is called the "Worshipful Master", but it is archaic language from centuries ago. "Worshipful" has nothing to do with religion. In context, it means "honorable"; some places still address mayors as "Your Worship". Similarly, "master" just means the boss, what most clubs would call the "president". Think "scoutmaster" or "bandmaster".

The benefits of joining Freemasonry are sometimes hard to answer, because each man gets different things from it. Masonry above all is a system or philosophy of morality, using a great deal of symbolism and allegory. For instance, the square used by the old stone masons reminds you to treat everybody "squarely" – fairly (think "square deal"). A man wanting to be a better member of society may find it easier when surrounded by other men with the same wishes. There is a social aspect, of course. There is the chance to help others. Some would say it helps build the individual to become a better man.

The benefits that Freemasonry gets from the individual vary greatly. Each individual brings their own uniqueness to Masonry. They have brought friendship, support, laughter, common sense, wisdom. They all help to give the other members a better understanding of the world around us.



We all take the same obligations. These obligations certainly descended from the medieval British stone-working masons, although its precise history is lost in time. In those rude times, punishments were harsh and bloody. Today, the worst the Masons can do to a member who has misbehaved is to expel him from the Craft, but the old obligations (explicitly referred to as symbolic) are retained as traditional and especially to remind the new Mason about how he should feel if he were ever tempted to break his word.

You can quit being a Mason at any time by simply writing a note saying so. It is expected that if you owe the Lodge dues, that he as a man of honor will pay those, but there is no mechanism to either force him to or to stay against his will.

Applicants must meet one of the following criteria: be the son, daughter, grandson, of granddaughter of an Arizona Master Mason, or be an Arizona member (or and Arizona senior/majority member) of DeMolay, Rainbow for Girls or Job's Daughters. The applicant must use the scholarship monies to attend a school of higher learning within the State of Arizona, unless the major course or discipline of study is not offered within the State of Arizona. Then and only then, can the scholarship monies be used toward attendance of an out-of-state institution of higher learning. Must be a full time student in an undergraduate program (carry and complete a minimum of 12 semester hours).

Inasmuch as considerable work must be done by applicants to complete the application and compile the necessary documents, it is urged that applicants not delay in doing the necessary paperwork. (I will email you this notice if you request at (jackeb@msn.com).

Scholarship Rules and Additional Instructions

- 1. The applicant must be an Arizona resident.
- The applicants must meet one of the following criteria: be the son, daughter, grandson, or granddaughter of an Arizona Master Mason, or be an Arizona member (or an Arizona senior/majority member) of DeMolay, Rainbow for Girls or Job's Daughters.
- 3. The applicant must use the scholarship monies to attend a school of higher learning within the State of Arizona, unless the major course or discipline of study is not offered within the State of Arizona. Then, and only then, can the scholarship monies be used toward attendance of an out-of-state institution of higher learning. Must be a full time student in an undergraduate program (carry and complete a minimum of 12 semester hours).
- 4. The applicant should read and fill out the reverse side of this form. It should be done with care, forethought and neatness. The applicant should remember the impression he/she is giving the committee. Be concise and accurate in all answers, but be sure to give all the information requested. If there are any extenuating circumstances in any area, be specific and state them.
- 5. After completing the form, sign it, and attach it to the form with all other requested information and see that it is delivered to your local Masonic Blue Lodge Secretary by **April 1, 2020**.
- The Lodge Secretary will verify that the form is completely filled out and that the requested information is attached. He also will validate Rule 2 above.
- 7. The **Lodge Secretary** will then sign this side of the form, signifying that their Lodge is your sponsor.
- The Lodge Secretary will then mail your "Scholarship Packet" to the Chairman of the Grand Lodge Scholarship Committee by May 1, 2020. The current chairman is Jack Bender, 16116 E. Glendora Dr., Fountain Hills AZ 85268, Email: jackeb8@msn.com
- 9. The Committee will review the applications, and successful applicants will be notified in mid-July.
- 10. The new Grand Lodge Scholars may be asked to participate in a Masonic Recognition Program honoring them. If there are any questions about this, the successful applicant should discuss it with the Lodge Secretary or Scholarship Chairman.
- 11. Application packets are not returned but may be given to other Masonic groups who have Scholarship programs.

The other half of the scholarship will be mailed after the Scholarship Committee Chairman receives the Grand Lodge Scholar's first semester grades. Grand Lodge Scholars are expected to have a first semester grade point average of 2.50, complete at least 12 hours, and be registered for at least 12 credit hours for the Spring Semester in order for the remainder of the scholarship to be awarded.
- 13. Applicants may apply every year, as each year is independent of the preceding year.






