
Congratulations to Worshipful Brother Mikel K. White on his appointment as our District Deputy Grand Master for 2020–2021.

# Flags, Fireworks, parchment(s), and silver signs

Our annual family vacation to the East coast (often referred to as the right coast) was both exciting and as always, short-lived. It began shortly after arriving with a three-day non-stop celebration of the

birth of this great and glorious nation. Each day the event was held at a different venue of a prominent member of a small rural community, with each moment, person, and mortar round more beautiful than the next. The excitement leading up to the grand finale which glistened across the Chesapeake Bay on the third day was far more spectacular to any I have ever seen.

In our travels I was also fortunate enough to meet for lunch with the Junior Past District Deputy Grand Master of the Commonwealth of Virginia. It was a well-enjoyed visit and also an immense historical lesson on the forming of their Grand Lodge and of the rich-soaked history in the soils of that region, in the building and founding of the continental United States. He said to me, "I often tell people, if you didn't like history or seafood, you were liable to be deported from where I'm from."

The following day we were warmly greeted outside of Lancaster Union Lodge #88 A.F.&A.M. by their long severing secretary WB Linwood Spears, 32°, and were given an extended tour and history of their Temple and of their more than 200+ years of service to the Craft, outstanding.

I know you must be thinking how could it have gotten any better than that, well, it did: in contemplation, leaving those events, men, and meetings, as I drove around the heart of the Nation, I was left with a deep pondering of understanding for the Great Men who had gone before us to take on such monumental tasks, that lead to even much larger and greater achievements. Thomas Jefferson, one of the founding fathers who drafted the Declaration of Independence and later went on to secure the Louisiana Purchase, thus extending the territories of the United States; the great Dwight "Ike" Eisenhower, who connected the union by the diverse integration and implementation of the National Interstate highway system and created NASA along with the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency, literally putting us on the map; the great Franklin D. Roosevelt, who made miraculous progress for the Nation and was the only president to have been elected to four consecutive terms in office and died suddenly very early into his fourth term as president. ## **Professionalism**

The definition of professionalism by Merriam-Webster is "the conduct, aims, or qualities that characterize or mark a profession or professional person". Professionalism is being an expert and specializing in the knowledge of one's professionalism of their practice. A Mason is measured by

his ability to do his job successfully, tactfully, and professionally. Being a professional at everything you do will help you succeed in every aspect of your life. Freemasons are considered professionals. How we learn, subdue our passions, and even improve ourselves in Masonry make us the elite fraternal force we are.

Professionalism is about being highly motivated and doing what is asked of you and following through with whatever is asked of you to do, showing up early and being on time, in the right uniform (for your lodge), or look like you are ready for whatever task may be assigned to you, as well as looking up to and following Masonic Values at all times no matter what the situation. # Masonic Trivia – Past Master Symbol

The Past Master symbol is an often seen but not so frequently explained Masonic Symbol. It commonly consists of the Compass, Sun, and Quadrant (or Protractor), and in most jurisdictions a Square.

The Compass has a familiar interpretation, for it is by the Compass that a Mason is reminded to keep his actions within due bounds. The Square also has a familiar meaning, for in acting on the Square a Mason conducts himself honestly, with morality and virtue. The Square is the Master's Jewel (a reminder of how he should govern) and is a part of the Past Master's symbol as a reminder of the office he held.

The Quadrant is the arc that the Compass rests upon, either below or in place of the square on the familiar symbol of the fraternity. The Quadrant shows what angle the Compass is opened at. Symbolically, as every Mason is supposed to use the Compass to keep his actions within due bounds, it is the Quadrant that measures those due bounds and it is the responsibility of the Master of the Lodge to ensure that Masons under his jurisdiction are making proper use of their own Compass. The Quadrant also shows the Compass to be open to 60 degrees or the angle of an equilateral triangle, which is a symbol of balance. The Compass paired with the Quadrant could also be seen as a Sextant, a navigation tool used to measure altitude. The Sextant also signifies that the Past Master has observed the sun at meridian height (the South), setting (the West), and rising (the East).

In some jurisdictions around the world, the 47<sup>th</sup> Problem of Euclid suspended by the Square is used as the Past Master Symbol. The 47<sup>th</sup> Problem of Euclid (also known as the Pythagorean Theorem) is used to prove a square, a vital skill to ancient builders. Suspended by the Square, the symbol represents the knowledge and wisdom a Past Master has gained from his service to his Lodge and Masonry in general.

What's up brothers,

Let's start off with some good news – we're back! We just had our first stated meeting in Lodge since this whole COVID–19 happened. And now it's time to put the work in and do some degree work. (Hopefully we don't get shut down again.)

I also had the pleasure in going to a Brother's house with WM Mike Kofta, WB Mike Dale, and Brother Roy Wright to present to him his 50-year pin. He was super excited to see some brothers at his door step. That showed me brotherly love and why I became a Mason. Being a Mason is not just a title that you turn on or off. For me, it is something that came into my life and will always be there.



# FROM THE UNKNOWN MASON

Have you ever wondered why the North East is the position of the Corner Stone and therefore the new Entered Apprentice?

The reason for this comes from Operative Masonry where the first stone of a building is placed in the North East. I did say traditionally the North East is the site of the first or foundation stone.

As a matter of fact this particular stone is not always placed in that corner. When such is the case, symbolically, the location of that stone in the building is the North East corner. Why you may ask? Building operations require good light to properly lay the stones and our ancient

brethren did not have the advantage of the electric light. They were required to make the best use of the sunlight while it lasted. The stones in the corner had to be laid with great exactness and since, in the civilized world of that day, the sun rose in the north east, that corner would be the natural place to begin. This corner was the only place where the early morning sun would shine on both of the outer walls of the stone and permit accurate placing by sunlight. Of course, this was in the Northern Hemisphere.

It can be noted here that in all the traditions and legends about this corner, it represents the source of the dawn, the place of beginning where the sun's rays first strike the stone and therefore it symbolizes the Entered Apprentice beginning his Masonic life.

We are taught Masonically that the North is a place of darkness and represents the non-Masonic world, while the East as the source of light represents the Lodge. The Corner Stone in the North East corner has one side towards the North and the Other towards the East. The Entered Apprentice in that corner, therefore, represents one that has just emerged from the darkness of the North but has not wholly left it.
