

#### MUSINGS FROM THE DESK OF THE SENIOR GRAND DEACON By WB Michael Dale CARDINAL VIRTUES

The cardinal virtues are the four principal moral virtues. The English word *cardinal* comes from the Latin word *cardo*, which means "hinge." All other virtues hinge on these four: temperance, fortitude, prudence, and justice. We as Freemasons are introduced to these virtues in the First Degree.

Plato first discussed the cardinal virtues in the *Republic* and they entered into Christian teaching by way of Plato's disciple Aristotle. Unlike the theological virtues, which are the gifts of God through grace, the four cardinal virtues can be practiced by anyone; thus, they represent the foundation of natural morality.

Temperance is the restraint of our desires or passions. Food, drink, and sex are all necessary for our survival, individually and as a species; yet a disordered desire for any of these goods can have disastrous consequences, physical and moral.

Temperance is the virtue that attempts to keep us from excess and, as such, requires the balancing of legitimate goods against our inordinate desire for them. Our legitimate use of such goods may be different at different times; temperance is the "golden mean" that helps us determine how far we can act on our desires.

Fortitude is commonly called *courage*. It is very different from what we think of as courage today. Fortitude allows us to overcome fear and to remain steady in our will in the face of obstacles, but it is always reasoned and reasonable; the person exercising fortitude does not seek danger for danger's sake. Fortitude gives us the strength to do the *right* thing.

Fortitude is the only one of the cardinal virtues that is also a gift of the Holy Spirit, allowing us to rise above our natural fears in defense of the Christian faith.

Prudence is concerned with the intellect. Aristotle defined prudence as *recta ratio agibilium*, "right reason applied to practice." It is the virtue that allows us to judge correctly what is right and what is wrong in any given situation. When we mistake the evil for the good, we are not exercising prudence – in fact, we are showing our lack of it.

Because it is so easy to fall into error, prudence requires us to seek the counsel of others, particularly those we know to be sound judges of morality. Disregarding the advice or warnings of others whose judgment does not coincide with ours is a sign of imprudence.

Justice is concerned with the will. Justice is the constant and permanent determination to give everyone his or her rightful due. We say that "justice is blind" because it should not matter what we think of a particular person. If we owe him a debt, we must repay exactly what we owe.

Justice is connected to the idea of rights. While we often use justice in a negative sense ("He got what he deserved"), justice in its proper sense is positive. Injustice occurs when we as individuals or by law deprive someone of that which he is owed. Legal rights can never outweigh natural ones.

I found the following by William R. Fischer which I believe is just as true today as when it was written in the early 1900s.

If you had three wishes what would you wish for? Most people would wish to:

- 1. Live forever.
- 2. Win the lottery.
- 3. Have peace on earth.

Living forever, although it seems immortal, is one of the most mortal parts of mankind abilities. We all live forever, for as long as you live that is forever. When your body expires your spirit lives on and people who know you will remember you, and that remembrance will keep you living forever.

Winning the lottery is much more difficult. First you have to play to win and then be one out of twenty million. But all of this does not matter because we have enough for ourselves and our families. We have enough to live on and to survive; we may not have it as easy as others but we have enough.

Peace on earth is a matter of cooperation and understanding. The more we understand each other the less difficult it will be to cooperate and achieve peace.

We can be sure that some have other wants or needs, noble and selfish, but what about an alternative. How about ABILITY, STRENGTH, and WISDOM.

With ability, TEMPERANCE would be easy. If you have the ability to accomplish what you wish, temperance would be the first accomplishment. To be able to control one's desires is the goal of every good man. This would make it easy for you to help others through your example and your knowledge.

With strength, FORTITUDE is a part. To be strong of character you must have fortitude. Fortitude is the driving force in strength of character. This would give you the skill to deal with those who would subvert the good you are trying to do.

With wisdom, PRUDENCE would be found and JUSTICE could be served. Prudence is a part of wisdom. To be wise is to be prudent. Justice is known to a wise person. Thus, to be wise is to have the know-how to administer justice. Having the knowledge to use prudence and dispense justice can only come from wisdom. Thus, we would be able to tell who is in need and who is causing the pain of need.

So if given three wishes, maybe we should wish for:

- The ability to help those in need.
- The strength to forgive those who cause pain.
- The wisdom to know the difference.

If we all did this we would still live forever, we would all be richer, and peace on earth would last for an eternity.



Patience – you are told to wait a time of patience. That is the beginning of the lesson and soon forgotten, then you are told again, and again, then...the mistake is made and you can't learn anymore. Have patience in life, with people and with learning.

MESSAGE FROM YORK RITE

The Knights of York Cross of Honour (KYCH) was established as an Honor Group for York Rite Masons. The requirement for membership are that each proposed candidate for membership

must have presided over a Lodge as Worshipful Master, over a Royal Arch Chapter as Excellent High Priest, over a Council as Thrice Illustrious Master, and over a Commandery as Eminent Commander for at least one entire year. Knights of the York Rite Cross of Honour are York Rite Masons who are dedicated to serving the Masonic Fraternity as a labor of love.

No individual aspires to membership in KYCH. When the individual has completed the work and labor and has done it well, he will be rewarded by being invited to become a member. Prior to being invited, the name of the individual is submitted by a member of the Priory. The prospective member will not know that he has been elected to petition for membership.

Just serving as the Master, High Priest, Thrice Illustrious Master, and Eminent Commander does not automatically make you eligible for this prestigious honor. You must have worked for the Good of the Order. As a Knight of the York Cross of Honour, you are a proven servant of the Masonic Fraternity, your inspiration came from your Past, your Duty is in the Present, your Hope is in the Future, you must always remember – in all you do, in all you say, in all of your actions, take a good look at yourself, you are someone's impression of Freemasonry.

Congratulation also go out to Worshipful Brother Michael Dale who has been elected to the Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine and Appendant Orders.

The first Christian Emperor of Rome, Flavius Valerius Constantine, created the order after seeing a heavenly vision which caused him to convert to the Christian Faith, after which he passed away. Knights Companions of the Red Cross of Constantine is the most ancient of the Chivalric Orders or Military Fraternities. 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




