
Greetings Brethren,



ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST

The great prophets for eight centuries announced the coming of a Savior or a Messiah, among them stands out the incomparable Isaiah for the clarity of his predictions about the coming of the Savior. On this occasion we refer to the most recent of these prophets, John the Baptist, who preached on the banks of the Jordan river, in the middle of the desert. He achieved great popularity, led a hard life with fasting and privation. On his naked skin tanned by the sun, he wore a tunic, a knitted garment with camel skin in a sign of penance that he wished to impose on himself and his people.

John the Baptist imagined, according to the Jewish idea that the Messiah would soon come as an avenger and righteous warrior, raise up the people, expel the Romans, punish the guilty and then enter Jerusalem triumphantly and establish the Kingdom of Israel above all peoples, in peace and justice. He announced to the multitudes the coming of this Messiah and that it was necessary to prepare for it through repentance. Instituted Baptism in the Jordan River as a visible symbol of, and public realization of, inner purification. This new ceremony, this new preaching, was performed before immense crowds in front of the sacred waters of the Jordan. The immense crowd recalled the glorious days of the ancient prophets; giving the people what they could not find in the temple, they came from all parts of Palestine and even further afield to hear the Holy Man of the Desert proclaim the Messiah.

Jesus, who felt his divine vocation grow within him, but who was still looking for his way, also arrived in the Jordan desert. He wanted to see the Baptist, listen to him and be baptized publicly, he wanted to enter the scene with an act of humility and respect for the prophet. He saw the tough Ascetic man, standing in a wooden pulpit, under a rustic tabernacle covered with branches and goat skins. Around him was a large crowd. In a loud voice, John the Baptist addressed the crowds and said: "Amend your ways, straighten your paths to conform to the Word of the Lord. I baptize you only with water, but he will baptize you with fire."

John did not know Jesus, he knew nothing about him, but he recognized him by his linen tunic. He saw him, lost in the crowd, as he went down to the water that reached his waist and Jesus humbly reached to receive the sprinkling of water. When the neophyte raised his head, the eyes of the preacher and the Galilean met, the man of the desert shuddered under the wonderfully soft ray of Jesus' gaze, and these words involuntarily escaped him "YOU COULD BE THE MESSIAH".

From this point on, great events happened. It took a long time for people to understand that the Kingdom of Jesus was not of this world.



The following is the address of the Grand Orator at a session of the 2023 Grand Communications

Most Worshipful Grand Master Right Worshipful Brethren Very Worshipful Brethren Worshipful Brethren, Lodge Officers Honorable and Worthy Brothers and

Honorable and Worthy Brothers and Distinguished Guests From All Jurisdictions, Alike

My name is Antonio Lugo. I stand here each day as your Brother, and I am humbled and distinctively imbued with astonishment to be speaking to all of you at this very moment.

MW Brother Jim H. Baker has designated the article of his year in the Grand East to be Diversity. MW Brother Jim H. Baker's unifying exclamation for our Masonic year is the following statement, "Together we build, Celebrating the Diversity of Freemasons in Arizona." Our MW Brother clearly stated, "Masonry unites men of every country, sect, and opinion and causes a true friendship to exist among those who might otherwise have remained at a perpetual distance."

As we are gathered here today, may we reflect on the ideas and thought processes that embrace the very concept of diversity. While most may surmise the archetype of Diversity is quintessentially based on nationality, let us entertain the reality of the conviction of diversity itself, particularly among our brethren. Diversity in Freemasonry relates to the structure and assembly of brethren from all walks of life, nationality, work experiences, and perspectives. These varying contributions, attitudes, outlooks, and standpoints on life compose wisdom with direct concern for guidance.

I state wisdom adamantly as we will utilize the pillars of our beautiful craft to guide us through this composition. Please listen with your hearts to how leadership leans on the teachings of Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty as we proceed from this moment on and in the rest of our days, each one being our deity's gift.

Entertain this. You are seated next to a Brother with a unique personality and soul. Each of you sits next to a Brother whose ancestors may derive from a different part of the world than yours. We each view the world based on sociological, economic, and educational differences. You may be seated next to a Brother who has taken an oath to defend his country, and the freedoms allowed to us by being proud to stand by the flag of our nation and every nation represented here today. You may be seated next to a Brother who took an oath to run face forward into dangerous situations and ensure the safety of our communities. Brethren, who are skilled craftsmen, who can build a home from the architectural phases, and those who can build and fix cars to keep us traveling safely when embarking on our daily journeys, all references intended. You may be seated next to a Brother who has been raised a Master Mason for five years, and he is proudly seated next to a Master Mason of over fifty or more years. You also are among Brothers who are musicians, creatives, and authors, and find that creative, unifying, and collective consciousness that Carl Jung spoke upon, which not only frames us in character but also wishes to observe one another in a joyous realm, to build and work toward a common purpose.

Each day, performing the toilsome chore, of chipping away at the superfluities we own responsibility to recognize and remove. To fortify our souls, hearts, and minds as living stones, to strengthen our temple and every one of us, be that stone that fortifies that house, not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.

With fraternal courtesy, please grant scrutiny to estimate the preceding words. All of us are gathered in the unique craft of Freemasonry as fraters, cousins, sirs, sir knights, officers, companions, wardens, masters, and past masters, for all of the above, the one that stands above all, as Brothers.

When one calls this craft, this bond, this duty unique, keep in mind we are speaking about a distinctive, memorable, and one-of-a-kind bond between ourselves, our fellows, and that which we laid our hands on the volume of sacred law to uphold a promise, not only to each other, to the man we see in the mirror daily, yet ultimately to the ineffable, the grand architect.

We took upon ourselves a generous, chivalrous, and benevolent dedication when we knelt west of the altar and recited our obligations. We, as Freemasons, as Brothers, started a new life. This new beginning, this new endeavor, to take that which is inherently good, and subject ourselves to a remarkable transmutation of our souls, swearing to address our imperfections and pledging to help ourselves and others to make improvements. This vital and consequential promise or vow is equatable to the birth of a child. This child, this newfound us, reflects the work we are to nurture each waking day, hour, and minute. We would not allow a child on our watch to go hungry, so how could we, as already good men in heart, let our dedication to the deity go malnourished?

This voluntary venture of such an uphill task requires fortitude and fidelity. One may even venture to state strength. The strength to support requires courage, as critical decisions are to be made with time. Strength includes



the indispensable need for faith in our actions and decisions. Hence, we seek guidance not only in having the humility to uphold and maintain the attentive ear for wise counsel, but we give ourselves to have faith and seek the direction of the deity, to comfort our hearts and minds and grant us prudence, to be secure, retain hope and be open to the charitable counsel of our wise brethren and the voice of the deity within our soul.

What materializes as a result is the culmination of the hard work and efforts of brethren that have banded together to evolve toward a common goal and, with determination, diligence, and a prevalent cause, to create beautiful results. Beauty is exuded and represented by one or many moral and intellectual examples. The outside world sees these and what we hope to exude when we, as Freemasons, not only observe ourselves in the mirror but when our deeds, character, and actions are on display to the many lives we touch daily and the world around us.

Between our 2022 to 2023 Masonic year has ensued a beautiful synthesis of enduring Masonic labor and Brotherly love. Nine special communications occurred at the Free and Accepted Grand Lodge of Arizona. Both were conducted with joy and with reverence.

International relations were further solidified with the renewal of fraternal ties with the Grand Lodge of Del Pacifico Sonora. Outdoor degrees were conferred with an outstanding show of not only attendance but the participation of both the Blue Lodge and Grand Lodge officers working incredibly diligently concurrently, to provide the utmost memorable experience for our newly raised brethren to remember for the rest of their waking days.

Finally, many a proud Master Mason and Arizona Grand Lodge officers, as occurred one hundred years before, attended the one-hundredth anniversary of the George Washington Masonic National Memorial, marching in unison alongside four thousand Freemasons—the largest gathering of Masons in our United States in the twenty-first century to date.

While we celebrated the craft and admired this experiment, our country, which encapsulates the search for human happiness as civil society at our first president's Masonic memorial, may we not forget the special Brothers who were beckoned to the celestial Lodge above. MW Brother Jeffrey S. Carlton, Grand Master of Free and Accepted Masons in Arizona for 2012. Well regarded for his strict regard to character and upright nature of what is to be considered a Freemason and known for his ability to hold justice close and accurate to his heart. MW Brother Rex R. Hutchens, 33° Grand Cross, Grand Master of Free and Accepted Masons in Arizona for the year 2006. Who's scholarly words have echoed through the craft of Freemasonry worldwide and back and helped many brethren discover the introspective and intrinsically valuable truths of many a degree close to their hearts.

May we also not forget the many Brothers who have journeyed to that undiscovered country from who is bourne, no traveler returns. One such example is Brother Virgil Johnston, who, upwards into his mid-90s, would happily and cheerfully give from his heart, a tremendous amount of his time to ensure other brethren who may be immobile or in not such excellent health, could attend Blue Lodge functions, appendant and concordant body events, and our Brother would always share a seat with a petitioner, to share stories about his adventures throughout a well-lived life, and how much the craft meant to him and how much he loved this beautiful art we now have a piece of in our hearts.

We are now traveling into the age of Servant Leadership. In this age, the cultivation of the future is now our ultimate responsibility to the craft to continue to sustain and enhance our journey while lending to the upliftment, cherishing, and fostering of the new and up-and-coming leaders of this art we love with honor and dignity. It is time for us to harbor duty to that which we observed with rose-colored glasses when we first knocked at the doors of this Brotherhood. The same teachings and lessons we've internalized and relied on for guidance in our lodges and lives, it is now time to impart and treat the craft as that beautiful child that requires our utmost nourishment and complete care.

Do we strive to rise above the envy of another? While we are free to make choices, relying on the teachings gifted to us to fulfill our duties. To assist one another. To defend those who require it. By serving the common good of all humankind, we nourish the heart, making a difference in the world and cleansing the purity of one's soul.

Brethren, it is with deep reverence, respect, and honor to serve you all, and may we all continue to cherish this gift and promise we share with our deity in this unique bond in Freemasonry. So mote it be.

Our June Stated Meeting was our last before going dark. We introduced and welcomed our new Grand Line Officers and Grand Appointments!




























Community Service Law Enforcement Memorial




