Stonemasons and Operative Masonry Today

The early relationship between stonemasons and Freemasons has been extensively discussed and debated. Yet there is no doubt that there has always been a significant amount of respect and admiration for the men who shaped stones with their hands and built the world's cathedrals and other inspiring structures. It is reassuring to know that these stonemasons are still active and working among us.

For clarity, it should be noted that stonemasons carved rough-hewn stones into carefully designed blocks of different sizes and shapes to build the castles, mansions, and bridges in remote places, as well as the cathedrals, townhouses, and smaller churches in the cities. On the other hand, Freemasons have used the tools and practices of stonemasons as symbols of

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

operated the tools of the craft, they are now familiarly known as "operative masons." As Freemasons reflected on the work of stonemasons, but did not personally hew stones, they have become known as "speculative masons."

With the general collapse of stonemasons' lodges in the late 1600s throughout England and Scotland,[i] the concept of operative lodges largely disappeared. Without those guiding centers, stonemasons basically became employees working alongside carpenters, glaziers, and others at the convenience of owners or the owners' representatives. Their operative lodges disappeared almost everywhere except at cathedrals or similar massive sites where on-going repairs or additions necessitated a virtually permanent lodge. Regretfully, these sites did not have the freedom of the independent stonemasons' lodges, where they could choose their own projects and enforce their own rules. The lodges at cathedrals, today as in the past, were kept for the convenience of the religious clergy, who gathered together as a Chapter, and set out the rules and guidelines for the lodge at their location.

Yet the stonemasons' work has persisted. Due largely to the need to repair and restore ancient buildings raised with stone, they still carve stones today, some cut from the same quarries as in days of old. They use the same mallet and chisel, square and rule, that were used in antiquity. This was clearly the case at York Minster in 2008 when I talked with stonemasons still plying their trade after all these years, and learned about the challenges and tremendous satisfaction associated with their work. On site, Master Mason John David oversaw the work being performed, and was especially helpful in explaining the current state of their craft.

The challenges faced by these stonemasons included the sheer immensity of their cathedral, with countless thousands of individual blocks making up the massive Minster in York. Each stone had its own individual shape due to the space available, the structural load which needed to be supported, and the artistry of the piece. Many pieces, especially on the outside of the Minster, became so eroded that the design, human face, gargoyle, or fluting which adorned it was partially missing. For these, the Master Mason would examine all the surrounding stones to find those similar in design, and then craft a full-size model of how the replacement stone was to appear. From that model, the apprentices and fellowcrafts would carefully carve an exact duplicate in stone. Much the same process had been followed in the original construction, with the added requirement of basic design.

One of the most impressive elements of the construction of our great cathedrals and our small parish churches, is that they were "designed" and set out using only three tools, a straight edge, compasses, and a square. Using these tools it is possible to create regular and irregular polygons. A fifteenth century account gives instructions on how to draw shapes, up to a dodecagon, to create arches of varying curve, and to find the center point of an arc. All of these practices could be taught without the need for specialized mathematical knowledge. It would appear that these geometric "secrets" were handed down through the generations by word of mouth, experience, and practice.[ii],[iii]



In the ancient world of Operative Masonry the masons were often required to move from job to job much as in our modern time. It was further explained that ancient master masons, just as 1st class masons of today, were more likely to travel great distances than those of lesser ranks (FC & EA). Due to their experience (and today, usually a membership in the labor union representing the craft) they could move freely from job to job. Those doing so were normally members of a Masonic guild, whose members would, if known, vouch for the qualifications of (or recommend) another "traveling" mason.

In speculative masonry we as Master Masons may freely move from Lodge to Lodge (either visiting or moving membership) and upon proper avouchment or by testing be found worthy to attend another Master Mason Lodge. This is much the same as moving from one job to another or from one ancient Masonic guild to another.

Also, a Master Mason is a traveler from west to east, as east is the where the sun comes up, hence the source of light. This is why the master sits in the East. Because it is the source of light. Thus being a traveling man represents our journey from darkness to Masonic light (enlightment). We "traveled" symbolically when we were raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason. Remember the words, "It will be necessary for you to travel"? and the condition of the road we would have to travel?

In Masonry we are told to seek the light. Light in Masonry is knowledge and from that knowledge comes information and understanding.

Square, compass, and rule have continued to be used in this work. In addition, forms cut from sheet metal have been used which exactly matched each interface between the particular stone being replaced and the ones around it. The match had to be exact, because the surrounding stones could not be changed. When the work on each intricately carved stone was complete, the Master Mason examined it against the model and the old, damaged piece. If it was found to be a perfect match, a Mason's mark was carved onto one face of the stone which would not be visible to the public after it was installed. No stone could be placed into the Minster without the Mason's mark.

The object of all this work was to replace broken or eroded stones with solid pieces which exactly matched the load-bearing ability and design of its predecessor. If the work was done correctly, each person entering the awe-inspiring cathedral, with its vaulting arches and intricate designs, would never notice the replaced pieces. The visitor would only experience the same feelings which filled people when they first walked through the Minster 770 years ago. And if the work was done well, people would still be able to walk into this cathedral 770 years from now.

The York Masonic Hall stands in direct view of the Minster. It is easy to find, with the large words "AUDI, VIDE, TACE" inscribed above the upper windows. These words mean "Hear, See, and Be Silent," and are also found on the coat of arms of the United Grand Lodge of England. I was courteously invited in and made conversant with aspects of the long history of the Lodge and Hall by Bro. David Hughes.

The Beehive: Industry, Unity, and the Spirit of the Craft

Among the many symbols in the Masonic tradition, few are as rich in meaning and as often overlooked as the humble **Beehive**. Tucked within the Fellowcraft degree and sometimes engraved into our tracing boards or artwork, the Beehive stands not merely as a nod to nature, but as a profound emblem of **industry**, **unity**, **and cooperative labor** — core principles of Freemasonry itself.



A Symbol of Industry

In the operative days of the Craft, the lessons of labor were tangible. Stonemasons carved and built with their hands; their work left a legacy in stone. Today, as speculative Masons, our work is more internal, yet no less important. The Beehive teaches us that **diligent labor is a virtue**, and that each of us has a duty to be industrious — not just in our professions, but in the building of our character.

Bees, each with a task, contribute tirelessly to the health and productivity of the hive. No one bee is idle, and none seeks glory for their labor. Likewise, the Mason is called to contribute faithfully, without seeking personal recognition. A Lesson in Unity and Brotherhood

The Beehive is also a lesson in **unity and cooperation**. Just as bees labor not for themselves alone but for the whole colony, so too do Masons labor not for individual elevation, but for the good of the Craft and for the betterment of mankind. The Lodge functions best when each brother brings his unique talents to the collective — when we "divide the work and unite in the effort."

Consider what might happen if a bee were to hoard its nectar or ignore the needs of the hive. The system would collapse. So too can discord or selfishness damage the harmony of a Lodge. The Beehive reminds us that we are strongest not when we compete, but when we **collaborate**.

A Call to Purpose

Ultimately, the Beehive urges us toward **purposeful action**. It reminds us that time is precious, and that idleness is contrary to Masonic values. As Masons, we are charged to be ever mindful of our duties — to our families, our faith, our communities, and the Lodge itself. To build, to serve, to give — these are not optional for the true Mason. They are part of our spiritual labor.

The Beehive does not merely suggest that we work — it insists that we **work together**, guided by virtue, for a purpose greater than ourselves.

In Closing

The next time your eyes fall upon the Beehive, let it stir reflection. Ask yourself: Am I laboring faithfully within the Craft? Am I contributing to the good of the whole? Am I doing my part to build the Temple, not made with hands, eternal in the heavens?

Let us strive to be worthy of the symbol. Let us, like the bees, work diligently, live harmoniously, and build something beautiful — together.

So mote it be.

PYTHAGORAS, THE PENTANGLE, AND THE POWER OF PHI



"It is a symbol that Solomon once set in place and is taken to this day as a token of fidelity, for the form of the figure is a five-pointed star and each line overlaps and links with the last so is ever-eternal, and when spoken of in England is known by the name of the endless knot."

~ Sir Gawain and the Green Knight, translated by Simon Armitage, 2008

As a child, the pentangle/pentacle/pentagram or five-pointed star is one of the first complex geometric shapes we learn to draw. It can be easily created without lifting your pencil from the paper in five easy strokes; lending itself easily to be emblazoned on our notebooks, hands, shoes, and any other surface requiring starry embellishment. In Freemasonry, we recognize this symbol as the "Blazing Star," for reasons which are explained in the degrees. But did you know that this figure was once representative of the followers of the ancient Greek mathematician and philosopher Pythagoras, and represented the mathematical concept known now as the "Golden Section?" Let's talk about that.

All angles are divisions of a perfect circle, which is composed of 360 degrees. To find an angle, we typically use a protractor, which is a device consisting of one-half of a circle, or 180 degrees. The degrees of the angle radiate from the exact center of the half-circle or an agle of 90 degrees. The "point in the center of the circle" should feel familiar... In order to find the size (circumference/area) of a circle we multiply the diameter or width of the circle by an unimaginably infinite number, which we usually round up to 3.14, and call it "Pi." But to find the ratio of the angles of geometric figures, the "golden" or most symmetrical figures, we rely on the ratio of another infinite number; 1.618, or PHI. To find the golden section of a line, divide the total length by 1.618, then subtract that number from the length. The pentangle automatically does this in the bisecting of its lines!! Tough to wrap your head around? Maybe pictures will help; I know they help me. Here are screen shots of the 1959 educational Disney cartoon, "Donald Duck in Mathmagic Land," directed by Hamilton Luske:




The pentangle contains every example of Golden symmetry. The figure is composed of an upside-down symmetrical pentagon, with symmetrical isosceles triangles extending out from each vertex. In Figure 1, we see the full-length line depicted in red, composed of two sides of the triangles and a side of the pentagon. Then a shorter line in purple, composed of one side of a triangle and a side of the pentagon. Then, an even shorter line in green, composed of one side of the triangle, and finally, one side of the pentagon in white. In Figures 2 and 3, we break each line away from the star, lining them up in Figure 4 to show that each of them joined in order are exactly the same size as the next largest, thus demonstrating the golden ratio throughout the star.

This was why the followers of Pythagoras made the pentangle the symbol of their profession, inscribing it on signet rings to show their dedication to this beautiful ideal, and the symbolic balance it portrayed.





But wait, there's more! The pentangle also holds the dimensions of the "Golden Rectangle," which it creates in a very interesting way.



From Figure 5 to Figure 7, we collapse the star into its inner obtuse triangle, which has two acute angles of 36 degrees and one obtuse angle of 108 degrees. With the length ratio of its sides being 1 to 1 to 1.618, this is also a golden triangle, even though it is upside down and obtuse. But we see in Figure 8, if we drop the two shorter sides down to angles of 90 degrees each, and connect them with another side at 90 degrees, we get a Golden Rectangle, personifying what Leonardo Da Vinci called the "Golden Section". In fact, Da Vinci is why we call this equation the "Golden" anything, as he coined that term. And we still keep using the term, despite astronomer Johannes Kepler and others choosing to call it the "Divine Proportion," and Pythagoras and Euclid choosing to use the term "Extreme and Mean," which seems more descriptive of political rhetoric than geometry. But I digress. The Golden Rectangle was believed by the ancients to be the ultimate measure of beauty and symmetry, and we can see evidence of it being applied in architecture and art, with the golden dimensions to be found in buildings such as the Parthenon and paintings such as Da Vinci's "Mona Lisa."

But wait, what is this I see in Figure 9? Perhaps a hint of something familiar to our eyes, the intimation that perhaps something deeper lies behind the everyday trappings of the Lodge? Food for thought, indeed. Figure 10, finally, shows us the infinite nature of the Golden Rectangle, with pairs of equilateral squares and smaller golden rectangles reducing along the ratio of 1.618 into quantum absurdity. Following them in a beautiful curve that evokes the glory of the Universe, the Golden Spiral (with its correlation to Fibonacci sequence and the Lucas numbers) swirls through the squares into the depths of eternity.

In the end, I realize this article only scratches the surface of the influence of Pythagoras on Freemasonry. We haven't even touched the 47th problem of Euclid, also known as the Pythagorean Theorem. But I hope the reader enjoyed this short treatise on the obscure, but still relevant topic of the Blazing Star, the ancient pentangle of Truth.

"A CIVIL WAR STORY" by John Hohenstein Zerubbabel Lodge #15, Savannah, Georgia

So, the Southerners, as Southerners are wont to do sometimes, just waited.




